Question types

- **1.** How does interpretation A differ from interpretation B? (4 marks) *TIPS...*
 - Read and work out what each interpretation is trying to suggest. Explain what the differences are between what they say. 5 mins.
- 2. Why might the authors of interpretations A and B have a different interpretation about.....? (4 marks)

 TIPS....

Look at who wrote each interpretation, when, where etc (the bit outside the box) and think about why they might have different views. Why did

- they write it, who for, when and in what circumstances; why would these things make them have different opinions about the same topic? 5 mins.
- **3.** Which interpretation do you find the most convincing? (8 marks) *TIPS....* 10 mins
 - **3 paragraphs.** 1. Use your knowledge to say what parts of interpretation A you find convincing (in other words what do you know to prove it is true or partly true?) and/or not convincing (what do you know that contradicts it or proves it not fully accurate).
 - 2. Do the same as above for interpretation B.
 - 3. Conclusion; say which one you find most convincing and compare the two to explain why
- **4.** Describe two problems/effects/causes/features etc..... (4 marks)

TIPS...... 5 mins. Identify two problems/effects/features etc and show some understanding of each one.

TIPS......10 mins. Identify and explain at least 2 different points (so two paragraphs) in detail with supporting evidence.

- **6.** Which was the most important reason/effect etc of.......
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 - (12 marks)

TIPS......15 mins. 3 paragraphs. 1. Explain the first bullet point and why it was important (with supporting evidence/examples)

- 2. Explain the second bullet point and why it was important (with supporting evidence/examples)
- 3. Conclusion. Compare the two to reach a decision on which was most important and why. Why was it more important than the other bullet point, link the two together if you can.
